St. Maximilian Kolbe Prayer Service




This prayer service focuses on the life and ministry of St. Maximilian Kolbe, the patron saint of prisoners and the pro-life movement. The service lifts up the work of all pro-life advocates and highlights in a particular way the Catholic call to end the use of the death penalty.

St. Maximilian Kolbe was a Polish Conventual Franciscan who was ordained a priest in 1918 and was killed in the German Death Camp of Auschwitz in 1941. As World War II began, St. Maximilian became one of the only ones to remain in his Franciscan monastery in Germany. He opened up a temporary hospital to aid those in need and provided shelter for refugees, including hiding 2,000 Jews from German persecution. On February 17th, 1941, the monastery was shut down; Kolbe was arrested by the German Gestapo and three months later, was transferred to Auschwitz.

Toward the end of his second month in Auschwitz, men were chosen to face death by starvation to warn against escapes. Francis Gajowniczek, a married man with young children, was among those chosen to die. But Maximilian volunteered to take Francis' place, and died as he had always wished — in service.

St. Maximilian Kolbe died on August 14th and his remains were cremated on August 15th, on the Feast of the Assumption of Mary. He is the patron saint of drug addicts, prisoners, families, and the pro-life movement and his feast day is celebrated on August 14th each year.

I have called you friends, because I have told you everything I have heard from my Father. Reflection:

Let us take a moment to reflect on the words of St. Maximilian Kolbe, the patron saint of prisoners and the pro-life movement:

"We need to love our neighbor not just because one is pleasant or helpful or rich and influential or even because one shows us gratitude. These motives are too self-serving, unworthy of our Lady's Knights. Genuine love rises above creatures and soars up to God. In God, and through God it loves all, both good and wicked, friends and enemies. To all it stretches out a hand filled with love; it prays for all, suffers for all, wishes what is best for all, desires happiness for all because that is what God wants." - St. Maximilian Kolbe

We are all children of God. Even those who have committed acts of grave harm possess the God-given dignity inherent to all human life. As we continue to be advocates for life, we are challenged to live with the zeal and faith of St. Maximilian Kolbe.

May all the life of St. Maximilian inspire us as we work to end the use of the death penalty and promote a more restorative criminal justice system.
